## Shopping list

- 6 - Fence Pickets
- 1x2 boards for corners
- 1"Screws
- 2"Screws
- Wood Glue
- Finishing supplies
- Garden stakes or concrete stakes



## Cut List

- 4-1×6 Fence Pickets @ 72" (Side Panels, you can trim the dog ear off and work with a 71" Fence post)
- 8 - $1 \times 2$ Fence Pickets @ 11 " (Corner Posts)
-4-1×6 Fence Pickets @ 17 3/4" (End Panels)


## Optional Top Trim - CUT TO FIT

- 2 - 1×2 Fence Pickets @ 72" (Top Trim, non-dogeared from the center of the cuts)
- 2 - 1×2 Fence Pickets @ 19" (Top Trim, Ends)


## General Instructions

Considerations for Size Modifications:
If you alter the dimensions of the beds, work with your materials to make sure you have the least waste.
For example, make end panels a fence picket cut in half for a 6 foot by 3 -foot garden bed.

## Amlalla <br> STEP 1

Rip one fence post into $4-1 \frac{1}{4 \prime \prime}{ }^{\prime \prime}$ wide strips, by setting your table saw to $11 / 4^{\prime \prime}$

If you do not have a table saw, you can use $1 \times 2$ cedar boards.


STEP 2


Side Panels:
Use 1 " screws and glue to put together side panels as shown.
The post will overextend the sides by $5 / 8^{\prime \prime}$.
Optional: use Kreg Jig ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ to join the boards together in the center or use a $1 \times 2$ in the center.

End Panels:
Build your end panels exactly like side panels.
